

Photography Contest Rules

National Great Rivers Research and Education Center (NGRREC), along with Swarovski Waterschool is hosting a photography contest to celebrate United Nation's World Water Day, which takes place on March 22nd.

Water means different things to different people. How is water important to your home and family life, your livelihood, your cultural practices, your wellbeing, or your local environment? Today, water is under extreme threat from a growing population, increasing demands of agriculture and industry, and the worsening impacts of climate change. Tell us your stories, thoughts and feelings about water through your artwork. Join in and show everyone what water means to you.

1. This photography contest is open to all local students in Kindergarten to 12th grade.
2. The theme of the contest is "What Does Water Mean to You?". Water must be the focus of the artwork, this can include rivers, lakes, ponds, garden hoses, bathtubs, etc. as long as there is water in the photograph.
3. Students will also be required to provide one paragraph stating what water means to you, along with the photograph submission. There is no word limit for the written portion.
4. Students will submit their artwork electronically to NGRRECEducation@lc.edu. The submission needs to include the name of the student, title of the artwork, grade, age, hometown and paragraph.
5. This contest runs until Sunday March 21st and submissions are due by 23:59 (11:59pm).

Submission of photographs to the Contest implies consent and authorization to copy, distribute, or otherwise use specified photos at will for both Lewis and Clark Community College and Swarovski

Various submitted photographs will be showcased on NGRREC's social media accounts (Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram) throughout the week of March 22-26th.

There will also be 3 winners in each of the following grade categories: K-3, 5-8, and 9-12. The winners will receive a prize from Swarovski and a certificate from NGRREC.
